Q. Will we have a Saints and Sinners program this year?

A. Yes! As Saints and Sinners veterans know, it's a great way to interact with people you worship with on Sunday mornings. The goal is to strengthens ties in our church family by brining folks together in a small group to have fun and enjoy camaraderie. These adult gatherings are an ideal way to get to know people, discover commonalities, and develop new friendships. They're also a great way to welcome and involve Living Water's newer members, prospective members, and visitors.

Participants are assigned to a different small group (14-15 people) each month. The groups are spearheaded by captains who organizing an activity. 

Eastern Europe Crisis Response

The Situation:

On Feb. 24, Russian forces invaded Ukraine, launching land, sea and air attacks. Russia has launched air strikes across the country, including on the capital of Kyiv and other major cities. Millions of people fleeing the violence of Russia's war against Ukraine and are moving toward Ukraine's western districts and such neighboring countries as Poland, Moldova, Slovakia, Romania and Hungary. There are major humanitarian concerns for both internally displaced people and refugees. Many of these Ukrainians fleeing their homes need shelter and such basic necessities as food, water and toiletries. Care for people also includes pastoral and psychological support to address the trauma they've endured.

Our Response:

Lutheran Disaster Response is accompanying our companions in Ukraine, Hungary, Poland, Romania and Slovakia, as well as such ecumenical partners as this Lutheran World Federation and Church World Service, in their humanitarian responses to the crisis created by Russia's war against Ukraine. These partners provide refugees with immediate support and supplies such as food, blankets, water and hygiene kits. Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton has joined other religious leaders from Europe and around the globe in issuing an interfaith call for peace in the region.

Pima & Happy Valley Road Improvements Project Update

The City of Scottsdale's Pima Road Improvements will widen Pima Road from Pinnacle Peak to just north of Happy Valley Road to three thru-lanes in each direction, and Happy Valley Road from Pima Road to Alma School Road to two thru-lanes in each direction with roundabouts at Golf Club Drive and Alma School Road. Both projects include raised median or center turn lane, bike lanes, sidewalk, multi-use path, drainage improvements and utility relocations.

The Pima Road Improvements project includes a regional drainage channel to reduce the potential for flooding on the homes to the west which will be funded by fees from the stormwater utility bill and the Flood District of Maricopa County. The Pima Road project will include a sound wall on the west side of Pima Road from Pinnacle Peak Road to just south of Happy Valley Road. Noise mitigation on Happy Valley Road was not warranted.

Provided below is information on the upcoming construction schedule, but please remember schedules can be impacted by a variety of factors to include weather, materials scheduling, availability of resources, and coordination with others.

Current Construction Information:

Pima Road:

- Crews continue work to construct box culverts and retaining walls on Pima Road at La Mirada
 Shopping Center as part of the drainage improvements for the project. Work on the box culvert
 at the south driveway continues with the south driveway closed. Access to La Mirada
 continues to be provided at remaining Pima Road driveways and all Pinnacle Peak Road driveways to
 the plaza.
- Scheduled to begin the week of Nov. 28, crews will apply rip rap to the basins near the La Mirada Shopping Center to minimize erosion during stormwater events.
- Crews continue work on channel excavation for the future channel on the east side of Pima Road. You may notice increased truck activity as trucks load and travel north on Pima Road to the west on Happy Valley Road. No additional traffic restrictions are required for this hauling activity.
- APS contractor crews continue work relocating electric facilities along the west side of Pima Road near the Happy Valley Road intersection. This work is nearing completion south of Happy Valley Road, with approximately two weeks more needed to complete work to the north of Happy Valley. This work has been shifted to night hours to minimize the impact to traffic.
- Electric crews continue their work installing electric conduit on the east side of Pima Road nearing the Happy Valley Road intersection.
- Scheduled to take place the week of Dec. 12, crews will begin the first of eight relocations of
 reclaimed and raw water pipeline to accommodate future box culvert construction along Pima Road.
 This first relocation will take place on the west side of Pima Road, between De La O and Chama
 Road and will likely extend into the night hours to minimize the water outage to customers on the
 pipelines being relocated. Thank you for your patience and understanding during this work.

Happy Valley Road:

- Landscape crews continue work salvaging native plants along Happy Valley Road, within the City's right-of-way and easements, by spading and boxing trees to prepare for relocation to the contractor's nursery.
- Scheduled to begin Nov. 30, crews will conduct clearing on the south side of Happy Valley Road to
 prepare for placement of temporary asphalt on Saturday, Dec. 10, to accommodate Happy
 Valley Road traffic during construction. Clearing of the north side of Happy Valley Road will begin the
 week of Dec. 12.
- Scheduled to begin the week of Dec. 5, electric crews will install electric conduit on the south side of Happy Valley Road, from Pima Road working in an easterly direction. As this work crosses side streets or driveways, crews will work to maintain access; however, there may be short periods where access is restricted.

Scheduled to begin the week of Dec. 19, pipeline crews will trench and install a water pipeline.

Pima Road and Happy Valley Road remain open for travel during this work; however, there may be lane shifts or turn restrictions to shift traffic away from the work zone. During construction, business and resident access will be maintained, although there may be times wherein it will not be the most direct route, so please allow extra time for your travel during construction. Work typically takes place weekdays during daytime hours, though some overnight concrete pours may occur as needed. Traffic control remains in place even during non-work hours with speeds reduced near the work zone in the interest of safety.

AZ TAX CREDITS

Arizona permits taxpayers to claim multiple credits for contributions to charitable organizations and schools. This means that you can claim credits for donations to Habitat for Humanity (a charitable organization), and to a public school and to ACSTO (a private school tuition organization). For more information, visit https://azdor.gov/tax-credits.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

Preparations are now underway to build or remodel another Habitat home with Lutheran churches starting in 2023 in the Greater Phoenix area.

AZ law provides a tax credit for contributions made to qualifying charitable organizations. Habitat is one of the qualifying organizations. So, if you are going to be paying income taxes to the State of Arizona, you can claim a credit on your income tax return. Taxpayers filing as "single" and "head of household" and "married filing separate" may claim a maximum credit of \$400. Taxpayers that file as "married filing joint" may claim a maximum credit of \$800. You may do this even if you don't itemize deductions.

You can either send your check directly to Habitat for Humanity of Central AZ or hand your check to Stephanie Mclean, Financial Manager or to Marilyn or John Goesling. If you send your check directly, please note on your check that it applies to the **Northeast Lutheran**Coalition-Living Water Church. If you need additional information, contact Marilyn or John Goesling. And, if you are interested in working on the build next spring, a signup sheet will be available in the narthex once details are confirmed.

Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission Christian School

Here is another AZ Tax credit opportunity. This is through the Arizona Christian School Tuition Organization (ACSTO). One of the schools helped by this tax credit is the **Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission Christian** school in Rock Point. This school needs financial help. You donate right to ACSTO and specifically designate the Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission Christian school. Donors can give up to \$1245/\$623 (married/single) towards the original tax credit. Any donation above this amount will then go towards the Overflow Tax Credit, up to a maximum of an additional \$1238/\$620. It is clearly explained at the ACSTO website which is http://acsto.org. They walk you through the donation process right there on the website. The website also provides the tax reporting instructions and documents needed if you participate in this unique tax credit opportunity.


