A Message from Pastor Mark

I know Christmas just ended. But I would like to be clear that I am not responsible for the phases of the moon, nor am I the one who puts the calendar together, so don't begin to point fingers toward me when I start talking about Lent. To be clear, Easter is calculated as the first Sunday after the paschal full moon that occurs on or after the vernal equinox. If the full moon falls on a Sunday, then Easter is the following Sunday. And Ash Wednesday occurs 46 days (40 weekdays plus 6 Sundays) before Easter. And thusly, it all begins, in the middle of this chilly month of February, with Ash Wednesday on February 22 - complete with an Ash Wednesday Service at 7:00 PM.

With Ash Wednesday begins our journey to the cross. One of the problems we seem to have with this Lenten journey can be centered around the fact that we may not feel real comfortable in dwelling on the "how" as much as the "why" all that takes place leading up to and including Good Friday. Our Lenten focus has long surrounded the understanding of why Jesus died for us as opposed to how it all took place. We hold a basic understanding of the torture of crucifixion, but we have taught ourselves not to look too deeply into the details. The details make us feel uncomfortable at best. And it can be uncomfortable to gaze into the eyes of a dying man. But beyond how those details may make us feel, the significance of the Good Friday event is found within the sacrifice itself, not within the details of the sacrifice.

It is in honor and remembrance of that sacrifice we have created the tradition of "giving up" something during Lent. In keeping with that tradition individuals have refrained from a variety of different things for the forty day season. While such things are well and good, they do not truly reflect for us the gravity of the sacrifice that was made on our behalf. Does changing a dietary habit – like not eating chocolate - do justice in helping us remember the sacrifice made on our behalf? While the intention may certainly be a good one, the idea of us sacrificing something as inconsequential as a food product seems rather meager. I would say there needs to be something more to it.

Instead of demonstrating our appreciation of this enormous gift we have been given by giving up Brussels sprouts for 40 days why not discover a way to give. Collect a designated amount of money – a dollar amount for each of the 40 days – and use it to support one of the many missions supported by Living Water. That is a much more appropriate way to sacrifice of ourselves. Give a little extra.

In doing so what we find is that which we sacrifice – what we give up as a spiritual exercise – that sacrifice will offer a tangible benefit for another individual - a person in need. In doing so then we may understand a little more clearly what God has done for us. Giving up something of value for us, not because we deserved it or earned it, but simply because someone else needed it even more.

Living Water's 24/7 office fish dives into financial waters

Q. Did I hear correctly that Living Water has borrowed money from the IMF?

A. Well, you got the three letters right. But they're in the wrong order. Our mortgage is with the Mission Investment Fund (MIF), not the International Monetary Fund (IMF).

This fund plays an important role in the brick-and-mortar aspects of ministry by financing church land purchases and building projects. MIF's President and Chief Executive Officer says its mission is "to help grow the church and to share God's boundless love with the world . . . by providing loans that help congregations and ministries build, renovate, or expand facilities."


MIF and its predecessors have been the go-to lender for Living Water and hundreds of other congregations, schools, and organizations of the ELCA for over 150 years. Churches borrow from this ELCA lending ministry for three key reasons: it specializes in church building projects, it offers competitive rates and terms, and its loans are financed by faithful stewardship.

Lutheran lending dates back to 1869. That year the General Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church created a Church Extension Board. A total of \$1,800 was distributed among four churches. The lending continued, and 150 years later MIF finished the 15th decade of Lutheran lending with \$575 million in loans, \$493 million in investment obligations, and total assets of \$712 million.

Like a bank, MIF offers ELCA ministries and individuals competitive investment products. They include term and demand investments, retirement savings, education accounts, and health savings accounts. These customer deposits create a pool of funds for making relatively low-interest loans available. Loan payment proceeds replenish this pool, and MIF account holders earn interest in the process.

This financial organization's values are "rooted in Christian faith, Lutheran traditions, and our identity as a ministry of the ELCA." Interestingly, all six MIF Officers are women. Its Board of Trustees consists of four men and four women.

La Sagrada Familia Lutheran Food Shelf Needs Our Help!



Pima Road & Happy Valley Road Improvement Projects - Update

Provided below is current construction information on the upcoming construction schedule, but please remember schedules can be impacted by a variety of factors to include weather, materials scheduling, availability of resources, and coordination with others.

Happy Valley Road:

Happy Valley Road traffic is being maintained with one lane in each direction, currently shifted to the south from Golf Club Drive to Alma School Road.

APS contractor crews are currently working to relocate electric facilities along the north side of Happy Valley Road from Grand Vista to Golf Club Drive, moving in an easterly direction. Scheduled for approximately Jan. 23, work will continue from Golf Club Drive and continuing east toward Alma School Road.

Scheduled for Jan. 21, paving crews will place temporary asphalt where needed in areas that were cleared to make way for the improvements. Work across driveways will be conducted to maintained access; however, there may be a brief period where access is restricted to allow time for the asphalt to cure. Thank you for your patience during these periods.

Landscape crews continue work salvaging native plants along Happy Valley Road, within the City's right-of-way and easements, by spading and boxing trees to prepare for relocation to the contractor's nursery. Electric crews are currently working to install electric conduit on the south side of Happy Valley Road, from Pima Road working in an easterly direction toward Golf Club Drive. As this work crosses side streets or drive-ways, crews will work to maintain access; however, there may be short periods where access is restricted. Scheduled for Jan. 23, Happy Valley Road traffic from Pima Road to Golf Club Drive will be shifted to the north side of the road, still one lane in each direction, to accommodate work on the south side of Happy Valley. Scheduled to begin Jan. 23, work will take place to install storm drain pipe across 92nd Street and moving east. During this work, 92nd Street will be closed on the south side of Happy Valley Road; however, a flagger will be in place to provide access as needed. Once work across 92nd Street is completed, as work crosses Living Waters Church driveway, the driveway will be closed with church access provided at 92nd Street.

Scheduled to begin the week of Jan. 23, crews will work to relocate segments of wall, as needed, primarily in locations where drainage improvements will be constructed. This work will begin on the north side of Happy Valley Road, working from Pima Road to the east.

Scheduled for the week of Jan. 23, crews will begin installing waterline in the north side of Happy Valley Road beginning at Alma School Road and working to the west toward Golf Club Drive.

Pima Road and Happy Valley Road remain open for travel during this work; however, there may be lane shifts or turn restrictions to shift traffic away from the work zone. During construction, business and resident access will be maintained, although there may be times wherein it will not be the most direct route, so please allow extra time for your travel during construction. Traffic control remains in place even during non-work hours with speeds reduced near the work zone in the interest of safety.

Eastern Europe Crisis Response

The Situation:

On Feb. 24, Russian forces invaded Ukraine, launching land, sea and air attacks. Russia has launched air strikes across the country, including on the capital of Kyiv and other major cities. Millions of people fleeing the violence of Russia's war against Ukraine and are moving toward Ukraine's western districts and such neighboring countries as Poland, Moldova, Slovakia, Romania and Hungary. There are major humanitarian concerns for both internally displaced people and refugees. Many of these Ukrainians fleeing their homes need shelter and such basic necessities as food, water and toiletries. Care for people also includes pastoral and psychological support to address the trauma they've endured.

Our Response:

Lutheran Disaster Response is accompanying our companions in Ukraine, Hungary, Poland, Romania and Slovakia, as well as such ecumenical partners as this Lutheran World Federation and Church World Service, in their humanitarian responses to the crisis created by Russia's war against Ukraine. These partners provide refugees with immediate support and supplies such as food, blankets, water and hygiene kits. Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton has joined other religious leaders from Europe and around the globe in issuing an interfaith call for peace in the region.

Please pray for those in Ukraine, Russia and neighboring countries that have been affected by the war in Ukraine. May God's healing presence give them peace and hope in their time of need.

AZ TAX CREDITS

Arizona permits taxpayers to claim multiple credits for contributions to charitable organizations and schools. This means that you can claim credits for donations to Habitat for Humanity (a charitable organization), and to a public school and to ACSTO (a private school tuition organization). HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

Preparations are now underway to build or remodel another Habitat home with Lutheran churches starting in 2023 in the Greater Phoenix area.

AZ law provides a tax credit for contributions made to qualifying charitable organizations. Habitat is one of the qualifying organizations. So, if you are going to be paying income taxes to the State of Arizona, you can claim a credit on your income tax return. Taxpayers filing as "single" and "head of household" and "married filing separate" may claim a maximum credit of \$400. Taxpayers that file as "married filing joint" may claim a maximum credit of \$800. You may do this even if you don't itemize deductions.

You can either send your check directly to Habitat for Humanity of Central AZ or hand your check to Stephanie Mclean, Financial Manager or to Marilyn or John Goesling. If you send your check directly, please note on your check that it applies to the **Northeast Lutheran**Coalition-Living Water Church. If you need additional information, contact Marilyn or John Goesling. And, if you are interested in working on the build next spring, a signup sheet will be available in the narthex once details are confirmed.



Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission Christian School

Here is another AZ Tax credit opportunity. This is through the Arizona Christian School Tuition Organization (ACSTO). One of the schools helped by this tax credit is the **Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission Christian** school in Rock Point. This school needs financial help. You donate right to ACSTO and specifically designate the Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission Christian school. Donors can give up to \$1245/\$623 (married/single) towards the original tax credit. Any donation above this amount will then go towards the Overflow Tax Credit, up to a maximum of an additional \$1238/\$620. It is clearly explained at the ACSTO website which is http://acsto.org. They walk you through the donation process right there on the website. The website also provides the tax reporting instructions and documents needed if you participate in this unique tax credit opportunity.
