A Message from Pastor Mark

Growing up, Easter was the time for new clothes. It was the time to get something new to wear to church on Sunday, all in those days where we all dressed up to go to church. We wore the best of our Sunday best. An Easter Day picture of me at the age of 7 reveals that very thing – it is a picture that, unless my mother betrays me, you will never see. Me, in a new suit, complete with new shoes, a clip-on tie and a stylish hat. I am quite sure at that particular time of my life, if it was left up to me, a new suit would not have happened. Never liked the dress up thing, and I absolutely loathed the process that took place to get the new clothes. The choosing of clothes that I didn't care for, the trying on of those same clothes in an overly warm dressing room, and then the humiliation of standing in front of a triple mirror – in the public forum of a department store - while my mother pulled, tugged and adjusted the clothing I didn't want in the first place. For a seven-year-old, it was not the way I thought life needed to be nor should be.

There are many times that life does not go the way we want it to go. When we are a child obediently following the directives of an adult. When we are on a well-earned and highly anticipated vacation that gets rained upon. Picnics produce ants, tires go flat, a pink slip shows up, the back yard floods, the stove dies, the promotion falls through, the company closes its' doors, our investments plummet, the dog gets sick, a root canal is needed, the medical tests come back with negative results, that special someone passes away. We try, we plan, we anticipate, and yet life seldom takes the paths we plan for – for things change and life is altered beyond our scope of control. And quite often we find it is a change for which we do not approve.

It is the aspect of change that scares us the most. We fear the unknown because we simply do not know what there is to expect. And yet we have no choice but to deal with that which is placed before us. And while that which is before us may scare us, it can also anger us a tad, for there is that part of us that expects a certain amount of shelter from the hard, cold realities of life. We would like to think that God protects his faithful from such things. We would like to think that God surrounds us with some style of protective shield so we might not have to deal with these ongoing – and sometimes daily – traumas. But it does not always work that way. We may not get something to shield us from these traumas of life, but we get what we need to get through such events. We get what we need.

The one thing humanity needed, is the singular thing God has given to us all. We are reminded of that one with the celebration of the Easter Resurrection. That is the one BIG thing we need that God has given us. It is the world changing event that has made us Christians, well, Christian. It is the Christ event. It is the day that changed the world forever.

The one thing that is almost of equal value to the resurrection is what we do with it. In the resurrection we have been given the single greatest gift that God could have given us. Our lives are ones in which we are called and challenged to live out in a way that exhibits the love that God has shared with us no matter what challenges and traumas may beset us.

For us, Easter really is a whole lot of nothing unless we make it something. That does not mean that we have any power over the gift God gave the world in the life, death, and resurrection of his Son. What it does mean is that if we do not live our lives in a manner that is befitting of this gift, if we do not seek out ways to share our lives in the name of Christ and through the love of Christ, then the gift Easter is useless because we have chosen not to use it. It is not that Easter is useless, but we are useless to the Easter event.

You see we are people of the resurrection. We are called to live our lives in light of that gift of God and the forgiveness found therein. We are to live our lives in the name of God, seeking out ways to serve him in gratitude for the gift we have been given in the life, death, and resurrection of His Son. What we do will never be good enough to reflect the magnitude of what God has done for us, but what really matters is what we do is good enough to allow the world to understand the faith that has been placed in our hearts. Because when we live our lives in gratitude for what God has done for us, we allow the world to see what we are all about.

Q. The Message from Pastor Mark in the February issue of SPLASH! included a great suggestion. I like his idea, but what are my giving options?

A. If you missed Pastor Mark's message about honoring and remembering the enormous sacrifice Jesus made for us, he proposed showing our appreciation of this incredible gift in a way that doesn't involve giving up something during the 40 days of Lent, such as chocolate, apple fritters, or TikTok. As Pastor Mark pointed out, "That is a much more appropriate way to sacrifice of ourselves. Give a little extra...that sacrifice will offer a tangible benefit for another individual, a person in need. In doing so then we may understand a little more clearly what God has done for us."

Pima Road & Happy Valley Road Improvement Projects - Update

Happy Valley Road:

Happy Valley Road traffic is being maintained with one lane in each direction, currently shifted to the north from Pima Road to Golf Club Drive, and shifted to the south from Golf Club Drive to Alma School Road.

Pipeline crews continue installation of water pipeline in the north side of Happy Valley Road moving west from Alma School Road. This work is currently scheduled to cross 101st Place the week of March 27, with potholing activity prior to waterline installation. This work will be conducted one-half at a time to maintain access with a flagger in place, as needed, to assist in managing traffic while work takes place. This work will tentatively cross Golf Club Drive sometime around the end of April.

Scheduled for April 6-7, crews will mill (remove) asphalt on the south side of Happy Valley Road, from 89th St to Golf Club Dr. As this work moves across the front of driveways, access may be restricted for a short period as crews place back millings or aggregate to provide access to Happy Valley Rd. Thank you for your patience during this work.

Electric crews are currently working to install electric conduit on the south side of Happy Valley Road, from Pima Road working in an easterly direction toward Golf Club Drive. As this APS contractor crews continue work relocating APS facilities on the north side of Happy Valley, from 96th St to Alma School; and Southwest Gas (SWG) contractor crews will return to the Happy Valley Road area the week of April 3 to relocate SWG facilities, behind existing traffic control.

Crews continue work installing conduit across Happy Valley Road at several crossings. To better accommodate traffic during daytime hours, this work is taking place during night hours when needed, from 7 p.m. to 4 a.m. Sunday through Thursday nights, with a flagger in place to assist in managing traffic near the work zone. This work should be complete by the end of March.

Plant salvage is scheduled to resume along Happy Valley Road within the next couple of weeks, with initial work taking place in front of Eagles Glen and Desert Skyline Estates, followed by Desert Highlands. This activity will be limited to tree and cactus salvaging at this time, and coordination will take place with community representatives.

*Utilities such as Cox, CenturyLink, and Southwest Gas are working or scheduled to work to relocate their facilities along Pima Road and Happy Valley Road, which may require additional traffic control. We are working to coordinate these efforts to the extent possible to minimize the impacts, but appreciate your patience as these relocations take place to clear the way for the planned improvements.



Eastern Europe Crisis Response

The Situation:

On Feb. 24, Russian forces invaded Ukraine, launching land, sea and air attacks. Russia has launched air strikes across the country, including on the capital of Kyiv and other major cities. Millions of people fleeing the violence of Russia's war against Ukraine and are moving toward Ukraine's western districts and such neighboring countries as Poland, Moldova, Slovakia, Romania and Hungary. There are major humanitarian concerns for both internally displaced people and refugees. Many of these Ukrainians fleeing their homes need shelter and such basic necessities as food, water and toiletries. Care for people also includes pastoral and psychological support to address the trauma they've endured.

Our Response:

Lutheran Disaster Response is accompanying our companions in Ukraine, Hungary, Poland, Romania and Slovakia, as well as such ecumenical partners as this Lutheran World Federation and Church World Service, in their humanitarian responses to the crisis created by Russia's war against Ukraine. These partners provide refugees with immediate support and supplies such as food, blankets, water and hygiene kits. Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton has joined other religious leaders from Europe and around the globe in issuing an interfaith call for peace in the region.

2023 Vacation Bible School



AZ TAX CREDITS

Arizona permits taxpayers to claim multiple credits for contributions to charitable organizations and schools. This means that you can claim credits for donations to Habitat for Humanity (a charitable organization), and to a public school and to ACSTO (a private school tuition organization). For more information, visit https://azdor.gov/tax-credits.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

Preparations are now underway to build or remodel another Habitat home with Lutheran churches starting in 2023 in the Greater Phoenix area.

AZ law provides a tax credit for contributions made to qualifying charitable organizations. Habitat is one of the qualifying organizations. So, if you are going to be paying income taxes to the State of Arizona, you can claim a credit on your income tax return. Taxpayers filing as "single" and "head of household" and "married filing separate" may claim a maximum credit of \$400. Taxpayers that file as "married filing joint" may claim a maximum credit of \$800. You may do this even if you don't itemize deductions.

You can either send your check directly to Habitat for Humanity of Central AZ or hand your check to Stephanie Mclean, Financial Manager or to Marilyn or John Goesling. If you send your check directly, please note on your check that it applies to the **Northeast Lutheran**Coalition-Living Water Church. If you need additional information, contact Marilyn or John Goesling. And, if you are interested in working on the build next spring, a signup sheet will be available in the narthex once details are confirmed.



Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission Christian School

Here is another AZ Tax credit opportunity. This is through the Arizona Christian School Tuition Organization (ACSTO). One of the schools helped by this tax credit is the **Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission Christian** school in Rock Point. This school needs financial help. You donate right to ACSTO and specifically designate the Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission Christian school. Donors can give up to \$1245/\$623 (married/single) towards the original tax credit. Any donation above this amount will then go towards the Overflow Tax Credit, up to a maximum of an additional \$1238/\$620. It is clearly explained at the ACSTO website which is http://acsto.org. They walk you through the donation process right there on the website. The website also provides the tax reporting instructions and documents needed if you participate in this unique tax credit opportunity.
