

## A Message from Pastor Shari

Even though it was a few months ago, I remember that Saturday, April 29 was a great day here at Living Water! It was a day of conversations about a hopeful future for the church. Together, with the churches of the Northeast Valley Consortium, Living Water hosted Luther Seminary professor, Dr. Dwight Zscheile. With a book just recently published called "Leading Faithful Innovation," Dr. Zcheile shared ideas of how we might be able to tune into what God is up to amid the seismic changes the church and our culture are undergoing. Even though some people might hang their head and feel defeated, Zcheile suggested how it's important to open our eyes to the big picture of how our culture has shifted from an Age of Association (people voluntarily join membership organizations to find belonging and accomplish purposes in the world) to an Age of Authenticity (people look inward to discover and express their true identities apart from organizations). This shift has changed the way that people commit to belonging to a congregation, and therefore, it's important that we also shift our mindset in how we reach out to the people in our neighborhoods who aren't spending their Sunday morning in church.

With this mindset of an Age of Authenticity, Dr. Zcheile suggests that one of the first places for the people of the church to tune into what God is doing is to look to scripture. He uses a simple practice called "Dwelling in the Word," where we listen to scripture and allow God to speak to us through it. Some of the questions we can use with this practice include "What caught your attention?; "What questions does this passage create for you?"; and "What do you think God might be saying to you or to us through this passage?"

The second place that Dr. Zcheile recommends that we turn to is "the world." "Dwelling in the world" is a simple practice of reflecting on God's movement in our daily lives. If we take the time to listen, reflect and share with others, we have a better understanding of the work of the Holy Spirit in and around us. We can ask questions, such as, "what might God have been up to there?" or "What might God want us to do?"

Dr. Zcheile reminds us that there are so many ways in which the Holy Spirit is active in our community, so we might ask ourselves, how can we tune into what God is already doing? By getting outside of the walls of our church, paying attention, and being open; the opportunities to serve and share God's love just might present themselves more than we ever would have expected.

### Living Water's office fish shares the genesis and impact of the Northeast Valley Consortium

Q. I occasionally hear someone mention the Northeast Valley Consortium. What, pray tell, is it?

A. Three years ago the Grand Canyon Synod and the Dean of our conference approached Living Water and three other churches – Christ the Lord (Carefree), New Covenant (Scottsdale), and New Journey (Fountain Hills) – about exploring ways to work together. Recently, the group welcomed a fifth ELCA congregation, Ascension Lutheran (Paradise Valley).

The creation of the Northeast Valley Consortium (NVC) set the stage for these ELCA congregations to strengthen their relationships and mutually support one another in ministry. The NVC is especially valuable in terms of offering parishioners more ministry and fellowship opportunities. It also seeks to develop a stronger outreach presence in communities surrounding NVC churches.

Our pastors believe that joining forces makes us stronger together, particularly when Christian churches are experiencing overall membership and worship attendance declines. Pastor Shari views the NVC as an opportunity: "I love to think creatively about how we can reach out to more people and be an even stronger body of Christ."

The consortium is a catalyst for sharing multiple gifts and strengths. LWLC, for example, has strong Bible study groups, Children and Youth Ministry (especially VBS), community service, and music and fellowship ministries. Our partners bring to the table strong music ministries, a preschool program, experience in interfaith relations and social ministries, and other assets. The NVC's mix of resources paves the way for an array of joint endeavors, such as parishioners from other churches gathering at LWLC for presentations by Luther Seminary professors.

The NVC has established an impressive track record since its formation in 2020. One recent example is our VBS Book Drive Mission Project. LWLC put the word out this year, and our partner congregations donated a boatload of books. #### Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission Christian School


Here is another AZ Tax credit opportunity. This is through the Arizona Christian School Tuition Organization (ACSTO). One of the schools helped by this tax credit is the **Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission Christian** school in Rock Point. This school needs financial help. You donate right to ACSTO and specifically designate the Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission Christian school. Donors can give up to \$1245/\$623 (married/single) towards the original tax credit. Any donation above this amount will then go towards the Overflow Tax Credit, up to a maximum of an additional \$1238/\$620. It is clearly explained at the ACSTO website which is <a href="http://acsto.org">http://acsto.org</a>. They walk you through the donation process right there on the website. The website also provides the tax reporting instructions and documents needed if you participate in this unique tax credit opportunity.



## Eastern Europe Crisis Response

#### The Situation:

On Feb. 24, Russian forces invaded Ukraine, launching land, sea and air attacks. Russia has launched air strikes across the country, including on the capital of Kyiv and other major cities. Millions of people fleeing the violence of Russia's war against Ukraine and are moving toward Ukraine's western districts and such neighboring countries as Poland, Moldova, Slovakia, Romania and Hungary. There are major humanitarian concerns for both internally displaced people and refugees. Many of these Ukrainians fleeing their homes need shelter and such basic necessities as food, water and toiletries. Care for people also includes pastoral and psychological support to address the trauma they've endured.

#### Our Response:

Lutheran Disaster Response is accompanying our companions in Ukraine, Hungary, Poland, Romania and Slovakia, as well as such ecumenical partners as this Lutheran World Federation and Church World Service, in their humanitarian responses to the crisis created by Russia's war against Ukraine. These partners provide refugees with immediate support and supplies such as food, blankets, water and hygiene kits. Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton has joined other religious leaders from Europe and around the globe in issuing an interfaith call for peace in the region.
