A Message from Pastor Mark

Before the advent of our new digital age, most of us lived our lives grateful if we were able to clearly watch all three of the major networks on TV. And with that came a annual rotation of special movies that seemed to show up at the same time each year. One of those movies was the Sound of Music. About 40 years ago, I walked down the streets they road their bikes on. I was in the cemetery they had hid in, I was at the town square where they sang. In 1983, I was in Salzburg, Austria, the town in which the Sound of Music was filmed. More significantly in musical circles, is the fact that Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart was born in the very same town. In fact, one of the places in Salzburg I did visit was the church in which Mozart was baptized.

Music is a very important part of our lives. There is now a day that goes by that there is not music involved. We have it playing in our homes, in our cars, at our offices, in stores and even elevators. There are those times in life that we even wake up with music echoing in our brains leaving us mystified as to where it was that song came from.

Living Water's 24/7 office fish shares 2025 Synod Assembly highlights

Q. What happens during a Synod Assembly?

A. The Synod Assembly an annual June meeting that brings together members of the entire Grand Canyon Synod. The GCS encompasses churches in Arizona, southern Nevada, St. George in Utah, and the Navaho Nation. More than 275 registered voting members and visitors attended this year's assembly, which took place at Community Lutheran Church in Las Vegas.

This two-day event began with Holy Communion and was followed by the installation of two new pastors and the formal reception of three new congregations into the synod. During the bishop's address, Bishop Deborah Hutterer mentioned the challenges of pastoral shortages and noted the creative witness and resilience of congregations. The assembly also included reports, voting on committee leadership positions, and other matters. But rather than ramble on, I'd like to share first-hand input from LWLC members who attended this year's Synod Assembly.

I felt a moment of deep connection with my church when I looked around the large sanctuary at Community Lutheran and realized that the people there with me represent the same values and hopes for service and healing as I do. This is a heart-expanding feeling, that we are working towards the same overarching goals and trusting in God to guide us and give us the wisdom and strength we long for.

The Grand Canyon Synod is blessed with congregational giving that allows the synod to explore and support new and emerging ministries within our synod.

It is important for me to see how our little church participates in the larger community of the GCS, and from there to the whole ELCA. It makes me feel like we are a part of something that can help people here and all over the world.

My most important vote was for the new synod vice president. This is an integral administrative role in supporting both the Synod Council as well as working cooperatively with our Synod Bishop.

Attending the Synod Assembly offers the opportunity to learn more about how the synod operates and to meet the people on the front lines. It is the perfect occasion to network with other congregations in a relaxed setting focused on the work of the synod and to ask questions about synod priorities and programs.

Living Water's "Hunger Jar"

The large Hunger Jar is in the sanctuary during services, to the right of the water fountain. Offerings placed in the Hunger Jar are typically distributed 50/50 between local and international/global organizations or initiatives.

The Service and Caring Team Ministry at LWLC periodically determines how to distribute offerings to the Hunger Jar. Most recently, we split the 6/30/25 balance of \$ 1,870. We still allocated 50% locally but split it between three local organizations, St. Mary's Food Bank of Arizona and ELCA, Nourish Phx and Foothills Foodbank. Each received \$312. The 50% for the international portion was split between Lutheran World Hunger and Save My Starving Children. Each received \$467.

You are invited to make an offering to the Hunger Jar while the offering is being collected during the worship service. While the jar's tag line says, "Change for Change," your offering can be coins, bills, and even checks. And, if you prefer, you can donate through LWLC's online donation option and indicate "Hunger Jar."







POWER

Maximize your donation. Give more red blood cells.

Red blood cells are the most commonly transfused blood component, and therefore the most needed. Since they carry oxygen throughout the body, they are essential for trauma and surgery patients, those undergoing organ transplants, women experiencing complications from childbirth, and people with anemia.

Power Red Donation

During a Power Red donation, you give a concentrated dose of red cells, the part of your blood used every day for those needing transfusions as



part of their care. This type of donation uses an automated process that separates your red blood cells from the other blood components, then safely and comfortably returns your plasma and platelets to you.

Help more patients with one scheduled appointment. During a Power Red donation, a donor gives more red blood cells than they do during a regular whole blood donation.

Maximize your impact. With just a little extra time at your appointment, you increase your impact on patients in need.

A comfortable experience. Many donors say they prefer the experience of a Power Red donation: it requires a smaller needle and fluids are returned to the donor during the donation process.

Important Donor Information:

- We encourage donors with the following types to give a Power Red donation: O negative, O positive, A negative or B negative.
- Donors who are A or B positive are encouraged to give a whole blood donation, as plasma is needed from these blood types.
- Power Red donors can give every 112 days, which is different than a regular blood donation every 56 days,
- We recommend that females wait until age 19 or older to donate Power Red.
- In addition to meeting standard blood donor qualifications, the following requirements apply for those interested in Power Red donation:

Who is impacted by sickle cell disease?

Approximately 100,000 people in the U.S. are living with sickle cell disease. Most people with sickle cell disease are African American or of African descent. In fact, the disease affects 1 out of every 365 African American babies born in this country.

What is sickle cell disease?

Sickle cell disease causes red blood cells to be hard and crescent-shaped (like a sickle) instead of soft and round. As a result, it is difficult for blood to flow smoothly and carry enough oxygen to the rest of the body, which may result in severe pain, organ and tissue damage, or even strokes.

How is sickle cell disease treated?

Blood transfusions help provide a lifesaving treatment during a sickle cell pain crisis by replacing sickled red blood cells with healthy red blood cells. This helps deliver oxygen to tissues and organs and unblock blood vessels. Donated blood is the only source of this treatment.

How can I help?

Blood donors who are Black have the unique ability to help patients with sickle cell disease.

A person with sickle cell disease may need a precise pairing with a blood donor, especially if frequent transfusions are necessary. If a patient receives a transfusion of a blood type that is not a close match, they may form antibodies against the mismatched antigens. To help avoid transfusion-related complications, a patient is more likely to find the most compatible blood match from a donor of the same race or similar ethnicity.
