Living Water Lutheran Church Mid Year Financial Review – June 2025



On June 30, 2025, the book balance of our cash was \$435,838. The balances were \$44,209 at Wells Fargo, \$381,632 at Schwab (4.01% yield currently) and \$9,997 at the ELCA Mission Investment Fund.

The balance due on the mortgage on June 30, 2025 was \$1,008,155 (@ 3.875%).

Financial results through June 20, 2025 were well off budget. The combined general and mortgage fund had a loss of \$7,641 for the six months ended June 30, \$54,256 unfavorable to budget. The YTD loss was dramatically worse than the first six-month results of 2024. 2024's YTD June results were favorably impacted the timing of painting and tree trimming offerings and the related expenses, which were largely incurred after the offerings were received.

Offerings of \$451,694 through June 30 were below budget YTD by \$47,955. Offerings were spread by month in the budget based on the average timing of the last 5 years, but the timing of actual receipts can vary materially based on church members' situations. June YTD offerings were about \$56,000 less than last year. Interest income of \$6,713 has been recorded through June 30, \$1,425 higher than was budgeted.

YTD Expenses of \$472,951 were \$3,570 above budget, largely related to higher costs related to the 25th
Anniversary celebration (\$7,896) and the Synod Assembly (\$1,694). These unfavorable variances were offset by
Facilities costs being \$2,377 less than budget. So, for the most part, expenses have been well managed.

The July budgeted offerings are \$58,145. Offerings of approximately \$27,000 were received in July. So, it appears that the unfavorable variance to budget will grow considerably through the end of July.

We continue to work with the IRS on our tax issues (payroll withholding issues from 2021 and Employee Retention Credit filing). We have recently enlisted the assistance of Congressman Schweichert's office to help resolve these long-standing issues.

A Message from Pastor Mark

When it comes to Jesus' advice/suggestion/command to "love our neighbor as ourselves", we tend to apply it to a select group of neighbors and quite often only when it is found to be convenient to whatever we might have going on in our lives. It does not happen often, but occasionally, we are touched by someone who seems to have taken hold of those same life lessons as we continue to struggle to make part of our lives.

What follows is the actual obituary on one such person. Under the title of The Best Thing You Will Read Today, this very well might be one of the best things you will ever read.

It is the obituary of Mary A. "Pink" Mullaney was an 85-year-old Wisconsin woman who died in 2017. Below is the family's look back on the lessons of Mullaney's life.

If you're about to throw away an old pair of pantyhose, stop. Consider: Mary Agnes Mullaney (you probably knew her as "Pink") who entered eternal life on Sunday, September 1, 2013. Her spirit is carried on by her six children, 17 grandchildren, three surviving siblings in New "Joisey", and an extended family of relations and friends from every walk of life. We were blessed to learn many valuable lessons from Pink during her 85 years, among them:

Never throw away old pantyhose. Use the old ones to tie gutters, child-proof cabinets, tie toilet flappers, or hang Christmas ornaments.

Also: If a possum takes up residence in your shed, grab a barbecue brush to coax him out. If he doesn't leave, brush him for twenty minutes and let him stay.

Let a dog (or two or three) share your bed. Say the rosary while you walk them.

Go to church with a chicken sandwich in your purse. Cry at the consecration, every time. Give the chicken sandwich to your homeless friend after mass.

Go to a nursing home and kiss everyone. When you learn someone's name, share their patron saint's story, and their feast day, so they can celebrate. Invite new friends to Thanksgiving dinner. If they are from another country and you have trouble understanding them, learn to "listen with an accent."

Never say mean things about anybody; they are "poor souls to pray for."

Put picky-eating children in the box at the bottom of the laundry chute, tell them they are hungry lions in a cage, and feed them veggies through the slats.

Correspond with the imprisoned and have lunch with the cognitively challenged.

Do the Jumble every morning.

Keep the car keys under the front seat so they don't get lost.

Make the car dance by lightly tapping the brakes to the beat of songs on the radio.

Offer rides to people carrying a big load or caught in the rain or summer heat. Believe the hitchhiker you pick up who says he is a landscaper, and his name is "Peat Moss."

Help anyone struggling to get their kids into a car or shopping cart or across a parking lot.

Give to every charity that asks. Choose to believe the best about what they do with your money, no matter what your children say they discovered online.

Allow the homeless to keep warm in your car while you are at Mass.

Take magazines you've already read to your doctors' office for others to enjoy. Do not tear off the mailing label, "Because if someone wants to contact me, that would be nice."

In her lifetime, Pink made contact time after time. Those who've taken her lessons to heart will continue to ensure that a cold drink will be left for the overheated garbage collector and mail carrier, every baby will be kissed, every nursing home resident will be visited, the hungry will have a sandwich, the guest will have a warm bed and soft nightlight, and the encroaching possum will know the soothing sensation of a barbecue brush upon its back.

Above all, Pink wrote -- to everyone, about everything. You may read this and recall a letter from her that touched your heart, tickled your funny bone, or maybe made you say "huh?"

She is survived by her children and grandchildren whose photos she would share with prospective friends in the checkout line: Tim (wife Janice, children Timmy, Joey, T.J., Miki and Danny); Kevin (wife Kathy, children Kacey, Ryan, Jordan and Kevin); Jerry (wife Gita, children Nisha and Cathan); MaryAnne; Peter (wife Maria Jose, children Rodrigo and Paulo); and Meg (husband David Vartanian, children Peter, Lily, Jerry and Blase); siblings Anne, Helen, and Robert; and many in-laws, nieces, nephews, friends and family too numerous to list but not forgotten.

Pink is reunited with her husband and favorite dance and political debate partner, Dr. Gerald L. Mullaney, and is predeceased by six siblings.

Love your neighbor as yourself, feed the hunger, care for the sick, shelter the homeless, clothe the naked, comfort the dying, visit the prisoner, share the love. The life lessons Jesus offered 2000 years ago were lived out by some woman 1800 miles away. This woman whom we have never met, has through her life and has now through her family, reminded us what Jesus had in mind when it comes to loving neighbor. A lesson to be lived, a lesson to share.

Piecemakers Quilters


Next Session: October 15
